DISEC(Disarmament and International Security Committee):

1.Cyberterrorism

Recently, events like the Russian hacking on the US election and Israeli-Iranian tensions have exemplified the effectiveness and dangerousness that cyber warfare has in this technological age. However, unlike physical attacks and invasions of countries, there are no clearly defined plans of actions for responding to cyberterrorism and warfare.
